

assignments

attendance

Due: Every class

Value: 28 points (2 points/class)

Attendance is mandatory. Excused absences include: Religious holidays; Medical emergencies; Family emergencies. Participation in class is imperative. If you cannot attend, you are expected to notify your instructor(s) prior to class.

mix tape presentation

Due: Throughout the semester

Value: 12 points

Choose one song that makes you feel infinite and give a short presentation on what that song means to you. Explain any special significance the song holds for you and what emotions the song evokes in you. Be prepared to play the song for the class.

group scene rewrite

Due: 11/05 Value: 20 points

In groups you will decide on one scene in either the book or movie to rewrite. Choose something to change about the scene – for example, a character's race, gender, sexuality, location, etc. – and then explain how and why what you changed impacted the scene. This project includes two parts:

REWRITE. Your group will either shoot a video depiction of the altered scene or write a revised book chapter. Videos must be at least three minutes long and book chapters must be at least five pages.

REFLECTION PRESENTATION. Your group will give a ten-minute presentation of the rewrite, detailing your alteration choice. The presentation should demonstrate your intentionality with the decision you made and explain why you believe what you changed in the scene resulted in what you portrayed in the rewrite.

journal responses

Due: 9/17, 9/24, 10/1. 10/8 Value: 20 points (5 points each)

After reading each part of *Perks* you will respond to one of Charlie's letters written to his anonymous reader during that part. There will be four journal responses in total. Please make your letters to Charlie as true to your voice as possible. Be as conversational as you want but maintain proper grammar and avoid textspeak.

When deciding which letter to respond to, let the following questions guide your selection:

What major development in Charlie's life or relationships took place in this letter? Is this development in Charlie's life similar or different than your own experience? Do you identify with Charlie or someone else mentioned in the letter? Can you empathize with them?

final reflection paper

Due: 12/3 Value: 20 points

In at least 3 pages, discuss what you have learned throughout this semester. Draw on class discussion and personal experience. Let the following questions guide your reflection: What identities make up you? Which of those identities do you think most about? Which ones do you think less about? Why? How do you handle difference, diversity, and multiculturalism? Are you different in a way that makes sense? How?
